Tom Corbin: An Example of Leadership

Tom Corbin has been involved in politics since his youth. His father was a superintendent in Arkansas. It was because of this early experience around politics that he gained an interest in being involved himself. Out of graduate school in 1969, he was attracted to the Republican Party's emphasis on the responsibility of the person over the government as a source of changing society.

He served three terms as Mayor of Mansfield before he went to law school as well as running against Tom Wilder and lost.

When asked if he would run in the future he answered with a smile, "No, but if drafted." In 1997 he graduated from Texas Wesleyan Law School and began to practice employment law here in the Metroplex.

He enjoyed being able to influence public policy while Mayor. Corbin fought for the monitoring of a chemical plant in Mansfield as well as other environmental, financial and governmental issues.

Corbin feels that today's republican party is doing a great job of building consensus while looking at unique options to solve significant problems. In that same vein, Corbin also admires President Bush's ability to pull people together.

When asked about the current proposal to bring in outside arbitrators for internal city employee disputes Corbin replied, "I don't fully understand it" but that he "suspects" that the current administrative structure of Arlington has certain strengths already in place. He advised that the proposal and the current structure be closely examined first.

His many community activities include volunteering at KERA, being an Advisor to the YWCA, and serving on the Bank One Advisory Board which handles giving out grants for scholarships and housing programs. In 1992 he joined ARC to "network" as Mayor of Mansfield as well as get a feel for "regional planning" issues because Arlington and Mansfield were beginning to grow exponentially.

Tom Corbin lives in Mansfield where he practices law. He and his wife have 5 children who live in Fort Worth and Mansfield.

Mark's Remarks

How the Republicans Can Lose the 2008 Election

2008 is so far away but the thing our party is *not* doing now will decide the 2008 election. One thing that is festering with the masses but is being ignored by both parties is immigration. President Bush has proposed a guest worker program, but it has been poorly explained and has been criticized by many. At best it's a feeble attempt to address the immigration issue, and most think its amnesty by another name.

Republicans are scared to talk about immigration. When Pat Buchanan came out and said we need to slow down (but not end) immigration and allow time for

these new people to assimilate, he was brutally accused of being a racist bigot. When Republican Governor Pete Wilson in California in 1994 supported withholding government benefits to illegals he was savaged. This action by Gov Wilson has widely been believed to be why the Republican Party has been in decline in California. (Only Gov. Schwarzenegger's rise has buoyed Republican hopes there and he is rightly proud of his immigrant status-he is demonstrating the American dream.)

Democrats want more government dependency and are pro immigration. The industrial unions no longer call the shots in their party (the trial lawyers do) and have no influence on immigration policy. Republican fat cat businessmen are widely accused of wanting continued unrestricted immigration as a source of cheap labor. This may be a correct observation. Both parties want more immigrants to pay into social security to help keep it solvent. Both parties ignore the fact that our prisons and schools are filled with illegals. Both parties want to do nothing to alienate future voters and ethnic groups. Some in both parties want to give illegals driver's licenses! What part of *illegal* don't they understand?

But in the electorate, average citizens of both parties realize that immigration is out of control in this country. No one seriously wants to end it completely, but it should be tapered, and those with necessary skills should be given preference in immigration. Americans do not want to live in a police state where federal agents go from house to house looking for illegals. But it is madness to many where, for example, a policeman pulls over an automobile for speeding, and it's filled with illegals with no insurance, etc, and he can't send them immediately to the Immigration and Naturalization service or the border patrol for immediate deportation. It is

maddening that the Federal agencies responsible for policing our borders and immigration *release* these people into the USA *hoping* they will come in for their hearing!

I've come to believe if we couldn't reform immigration in the months after 9-11, we never will. Uncontrolled legal and illegal immigration, even from countries spawning terrorism, will continue unabated. How will this affect the 2008 election? Let's say in the 2008 presidential campaign, a 3rd party candidate, a Ross Perot independent type makes a big deal out of 1. immigration and 2. the twin obscene deficits of the federal budget and trade. Just like Perot in 1992 drew most of his support from grassroots Republican voters, this candidate would do the same. Candidate X would attract disaffected common sense democrats too. Let's say this Candidate X gets 12% of the vote and wins no electoral votes. Most red states will again go Republican, and say our candidate gets 43% of the vote. However we lose just 2 swing states because of votes won by Candidate X. Guess who wins the Electoral College with 45% of the vote? That's right, Hillary. Hillary sneaks in the same way Bill snuck in with less than 50%. Could happen? Definitely. Will happen? I certainly hope not. But this is a possible scary scenario.

WHO NEEDS A CONGRESS ANYWAY?

Who needs Congress anyway? That is a good question. Republicans elect their senators and congress members to go to Washington to represent their political philosophy. In Texas that philosophy is conservative and is set forth in the Republican Party of Texas platform as adopted by Republican delegates to the state convention.

The congress is the Legislative branch of government and is the branch of government which most clearly indicates the will of the people who took the time to vote.

After the elections what frequently happens? **The Executive branch**, which is led by the president of the United States who was elected by the electoral college, **begins to impose views of the president on the congress which are sometimes contrary to those of the constituency of members of congress.** Many members of congress bend to the will of the president and the Party leadership, for whatever reason, and proceed to vote against the wishes of the people in their District or State.

During his re-election campaign the president had little to say about his **unpopular guest-worker visas for illegal immigrants proposal.** The president's 'political capital' came from conservative voters who support his position on moral issues and military preparedness. **Knowledgeable conservatives adamantly oppose amnesty in any form. Guest Worker visas and driver's licenses for illegals is amnesty by another name.** Congress must stop this bad policy!

It is incumbent upon the members of congress to stand firm for the philosophy and principles of those who

worked for their election. This means that on some issues that are important to the security and well-being of our country **they must stand against the president when he is wrong. Failure to do so nullifies the purpose of having a congress which is the voice of the people and is tantamount to a presidential dictatorship. If that is their plan, then congress might as well disband and save us a lot of money.**

We cannot expect to sit back and assume our members of congress will do the 'right thing' just because it is the right thing to do, but **we must speak out repeatedly and hold them accountable to us—not accountable to the president or Party leadership—for their congressional votes. When the president is right on the issues we must let them know and when the president is wrong we must let them know.**

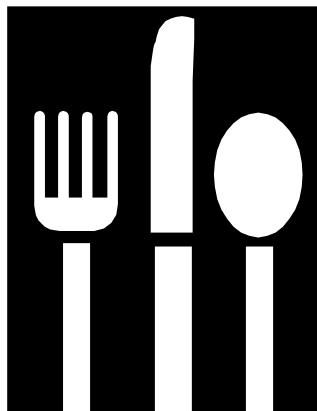

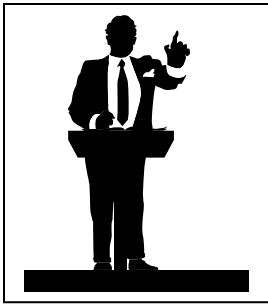

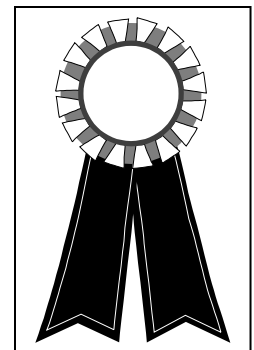
